

Beloved Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As we commemorate this Feast of the Indiction, the beginning of the new ecclesiastical year, we ask our great and merciful God to "bless the crown of this year which His goodness has allowed us to begin" (Hymn of Orthros). It is His goodness and grace that has brought us to the beginning of one more ecclesiastical year and to another blessed cycle of the feasts and observances of our Holy Orthodox Faith. In anticipation of the marvelous and wonderful things our Lord will accomplish in our lives, parishes, and families, we look forward to the blessings that will come through our worship, prayer, service. and

This time of year is also the beginning of the academic year when our children, youth, and young adults return to school. In addition, it is the time in association with the new Church year and the academic year that our religious, Greek education, and day school programs begin in parishes throughout our Holy Archdiocese.

These ministries are vital in teaching and nurturing our spiritual and cultural heritage among our youth, but they are also essential to the we-being II of the Orthodox Christian family.

With our continued emphasis on the theme of our recent Clergy-Laity Congress, "The Orthodox Christian Family: A Dwelling of Christ and a Witness of His Gospel," we begin this ecclesiastical year reflecting on the priority of strengthening families through the educational ministries of our parishes. It is also a time to focus on the important role of Christian education in the home.

In our sacred work of teaching, we must affirm that education in the parish and in the home involve a collaborative and committed effort on the part of clergy, teachers and parents. In addition to offering knowledge about our faith and Hellenic culture or teaching basic academic disciplines, programs in the parish should emphasize the identity of the Orthodox Christian family and offer resources that guide families in staying connected to God and the Church. Through worship, prayer, reflection, teaching in the home, families should reinforce the guidance received through the educational the parish, nurturing family ministries of members in the faith and becoming a kat'oikon ekklesia - the Church in the home (Romans 16:5, Colossians 4:15).

The Orthodox Christian family that is strengthened and guided by the educational ministry of the parish becomes a dwelling of Christ and a witness of the Gospel. The members of the family are connected to God and to the primary mission of the Church. Children and youth are nurtured in the faith. They connect the values, ideals, and treasures of their cultural heritage to life today as an Orthodox family. And the family receives the wisdom and spiritual guidance needed to seek the potential of each member, to mature in Christ, to serve others, and to bring honor and glory to God.

As we reflect on the beginning of the ecclesiastical year and our ministry to families, we also recognize that this day has been

designated by the Ecumenical Patriarchate as the Day for the Protection of our Natural Environment. With grateful hearts and as faithful stewards, we must also renew our commitment to protect all that God has created. We do this when we identify abuse, waste, and destructive practices and affirm the priority of sustaining and respecting life. We are also witnesses of our Creator and His grace when we seek to conserve, to renew, and to transform the world around us so that it is productive and beneficial for all people and for generations to come.

As we begin this new ecclesiastical year, I ask each of you to consider your efforts and concern for the natural environment and to make every effort to protect the created order. Regarding the family, I also ask all of our parishes to plan, evaluate, and offer the resources to ensure that our educational programs are helping families become Orthodox Christian families. May we make every effort to equip and edify families in unity of faith and the knowledge of the Son of God (Ephesians 4:13) so that each family member has the spiritual foundation to mature in the fullness of Christ, and the family becomes a dwelling of Him and a witness of His Gospel. Also, as we ask for our Lord's generous blessings through the cycle of this year, may we also pray that He will keep our families and the natural environment in peace, safe and secure from all harm.

My dear ladies and friends of Philoptochos,

I greet you in the name of our Lord and Savior and restful summer together with your families and loved ones. As we embark upon Jesus Christ, and pray that you have enjoyed a good the beginning of a New Ecclesiastical Year, we are reminded of the dedicated services our retired clergy and widowed presvyteres offered so many years to our Church. Very thoughtfully, the National Philoptochos Society has designated the month of September as the opportunity to tangibly assist these individuals through one of its national commitments with a special collection designated for the Retired Clergy and Widowed Presvyteres Benevolent Fund of our Archdiocese.

As you may know, some of our retired clergy and

widowed presvyteres lack adequate incomes and have to rely on the generosity of others in order to meet their day-to-day living expenses. These individuals live on a total annual retirement income ranging from \$14,500 to \$21,000, and as you can imagine, that is challenging in this day and age. Through your magnanimous support, this Fund has been able to augment the meager retirement income of retired clergy and widowed presvyteres. In the past nine years, in great part through your generosity, we have distributed over \$600,000 in assistance to these individuals. Without your support for the Benevolent Fund, the quality of life for some of these individuals would be greatly diminished.

As Chancellor of our Holy Archdiocese of America and overseer of the Benevolence Fund for Retired Clergy and Widowed Presvyteres, which distributes monthly stipends to these people, I humbly ask that you respond most generously once again this year to this annual commitment of all chapters. It is indeed a great comfort for these individuals to know that they are not alone, but that people like yourselves are ready and willing to offer whatever assistance they need.

The grace of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, and the love of God and Father and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all.

Aflac Cancer & Blood Disorders Center Atlanta, GA By Valine Georgeson

The familiar axiom "It is better to give than to receive" was certainly called to mind in Atlanta, Georgia in early September of this year.

At the National Philoptochos meetings in Philadelphia, Pa. that were held in July, 2014, the National Philoptochos Board announced that it was awarding a \$15,000 grant to the Aflac Cancer & Blood Disorders Center located at Children's Healthcare of Atlanta. These funds were part of the proceeds generated by the Children's Medical Fund Luncheon held in Pittsburgh, Pa. in 2013.

This grant will go towards serving young patients with Sickle Cell Disease and Thalassemia who come to the Aflac Center in Atlanta, which is a national referral center treating patients from 43 states, serving a diverse group from urban, suburban and rural areas.

Metropolis of Chicago

Children's Hospital of Wisconsin Milwaukee, WI

National Philoptochos Board and Metropolis of Chicago Philoptochos Board members presented a \$10,000 check to Children's Hospital of Wisconsin following the National Philoptochos Convention. Children's Hospital of Wisconsin supports full-time school nurses in nine schools located in central Milwaukee neighborhoods where we are providing a number of communitybased services. Children's Hospital of Wisconsin is investing significant resources to address health disparities and the most pressing health and wellness needs in these neighborhoods. Through our School Nurse Program, we bring health services directly to children who need them. The school nurses role includes traditional school nursing support from student daily care, medication administration, vision screening, chronic disease management and education, and support and implementation of health policies.

In addition, our school nurses educate children and families about the importance of preventative care and a variety of other health topics including anger management, drugs and alcohol, hygiene, nutrition, and stress.

Metropolis of Denver Healing House Kansas City, MO

The Healing House organization provides faith-based recovery homes in the Kansas City metro area for the spiritual growth, emotional stability and direction to prepare men and women on their journey from addiction while seeking a purposeful life in our community. National Philoptochos donated to this important center and received words of thanks from Halee Stimson:

Healing House was awarded a \$10,000 grant from the National Greek Orthodox Ladies Philoptochos Society! On August 25th, Marian Catechis (Philoptochos Metropolis President) along with five ladies from the local chapter

toured Healing House facilities and presented funds to be used for the purchase and installation of much needed windows at our family-friendly Spruce Apartments. The existing windows are an estimated 50-years-old with inefficiencies that have resulted in exorbitant energy costs. The installation of energy-saving windows is expected to markedly reduce annual heating and cooling costs through significant reductions in air leakage.

Thank you to the Philoptochos Ladies for taking the time to visit the Healing House and for your generosity in helping us in such a practical way! We look forward to continuing this partnership for many years to come.

2016 Chapter Challenges

How can Philoptochos Chapters inspire each other with their good works?

The Chapter Challenge initiative invites one Chapter from each Metropolis to research and implement a project at the parish and community level.
